NBA Weekly Update for January 13, 2023



National Bison Association Annual Conference Commences Next Week Under Theme of *The Bison Benefit - Good for Us, Good for our Planet*

Under the theme of "The Bison Benefit - Good for US, Good for our Planet", preparations are in full swing to welcome roughly 500 North American bison ranchers, processors and marketers who will convene at the Westin Westminster Hotel January 18-21. This is the annual meeting of the industry's largest bison organization, the National Bison Association (NBA).

The action-packed two days of conference programming features member recognitions, a bison junior judging contest, expert insight on topics and issues pertinent to bison health and marketing, and so much more. Amazing speakers include world-renowned regenerative soil specialist, Nicole Masters, who will serve as keynote speaker. There will also be a new producer mentor session, a bison hauling panel discussion, and the annual

bison marketer's panel session.

Preeminent bison-specific research will also be showcased with Turner Enterprises, Inc. sharing research results from their Grass v. Grain and Weaning Systems studies, and the Center of Excellence for Bison Studies' many research projects will feature a student-led poster session.

We'll also see the premier clip of Ken Burn's new documentary, debuting this Fall, that focuses on the American bison with Mr. Burns himself presenting the film clip virtually along with his producer.

The week concludes with the NBA's annual Gold Trophy Show and Sale, which is the premier bison breeding stock auction with animals coming from across the continent. The Winter Conference is preceded this year by a two-day workshop facilitated by Indigenous Led, which is a bison conservation and tribal-focused organization with works with the NBA to continue the restoration of the bison species.

National Bison Association Junior Judging Contest Offered at 2023 National Western Stock Show DRG News

Individuals 8-21 years of age are invited to compete in the Larry Higgins Bison Junior Judging Contest January 20, 2023, at 9 am in the Yards at the National Western Stock Show. This event is hosted by the National Bison Association and the Rocky Mountain Bison Association and held in conjunction with the Gold Trophy Show and Sale (GTSS) during the National Western Stock Show in Denver.

The GTSS has been the industry's premier bison breeding stock auction at the National

Western Stock Show for over 40 years, and participants will judge bison that are already there for the show and sale. Students will judge four classes of bison and provide oral reasons on one class, to be selected by the judges.

Top three individual contestants are eligible to earn up to \$1,500 in college scholarships. Additional recognition will be provided for the top three registered teams and the top three junior participants (12 years of age or younger). There are no entry fees. This event is open to individuals 8-21 years old who are academically eligible. Registration in advance is encouraged.

Where the Bison Could Roam

MALTA, Mont. — Around 200 chocolate-brown bison raise their heads, following the low growl of a pickup truck slowly motoring across the sagebrush-studded prairie. Snorting and quietly bellowing, their feral odors riding the wind, they slowly trot across the prairie hills, eager to maintain distance from the truck.

This knot of bison — colloquially referred to as buffalo, though they are not the same species — is part of a project to rebuild a vast shortgrass prairie not only to return large numbers of bison here, but also to eventually restore the complex and productive grassland ecosystem the animals once engineered with their churning hooves, waste, grazing and even carcasses.

"When you have large numbers on the landscape, they impact everything," Scott Heidebrink, the director of bison restoration for American Prairie, a nonprofit conservation group, said of the animals. "There are ways that bison were impacting the landscape that we haven't even thought about."

Since 2001, American Prairie — formerly known as American Prairie Reserve — has been working to create a fully functioning wild prairie, complete with herds of bison thundering across the landscape and playing their historical ecological role.

Crash that killed 13 Yellowstone bison renews push for wildlife crossings on Highway 191 From *The Bozeman Daily Chronicle*

Two weeks after a semitruck struck and killed 13 bison on U.S. Highway 191 north of West Yellowstone, wildlife advocates are calling on officials to seek out transportation funding for wildlife crossings along the route.

Buffalo Field Campaign, an organization that advocates for wild, free-roaming bison, launched a petition to support the construction of a "Buffalo Wildlife Bridge" at the Madison River crossing along Highway 191.

According to the group's spokesperson Tom Woodbury, members would like to see a wildlife-friendly bridge built over Highway 191 where it crosses the Madison River, between mile markers 2 and 4. As of Tuesday afternoon, over 2,200 people had signed the petition.

Ideally, the bridge would be designed for bison, but it would be capable of supporting other wildlife species. Fencing would be installed along the highway to funnel animals over the crossing and away from the road, and tunnels could eventually be added to accommodate species that aren't privy to the bridge.

The organization's petition calls on U.S. Interior Secretary Deb Haaland, Yellowstone

National Park Superintendent Cam Sholly and Custer Gallatin National Forest Supervisor Mary Erickson to earmark federal transportation funding for such a project.

Back to Basics: To restore America, let us restore our frontier, by restoring the bison.

By and large, resolutions are a little silly. If it was really going to change your life so definitely for the better, you should probably have done it already. Why would you wait for New Year's Day to do what is needful? It's not even a solstice. But we are creatures like other creatures, of rhythms and seasons, and so, silly or not, January is a month for getting back to basics, for looking ahead with resolve and making grand plans. Yes, perhaps we ought to have taken another course, or started this new one sooner, but here we are in 2023 with another chance to get on track and now is better than never, and late can be left for historians.

Bring back the bison. The significance of the frontier in American history is now a cliche, fought about in the way only something obviously true can be. Frederick Jackson Turner was simply right that winning a wilderness shaped the national psyche in a powerful way. The west provided a vital myth to American identity that could appeal across partisan lines and act as a release valve for regional faction—trapped wherever, there was always somewhere else to go. And as the land remade pioneer men and women, they remade the land, too. Turner was right that the closing of the frontier marked a shift in national consciousness. No longer winning a wilderness we won a world, exporting our preoccupations to every far flung corner of the earth. But perhaps the American character can be renewed in the renewal of wilderness, and perhaps that renewal can begin by renewing North America's great herds of bison.

Hunters see strong bison migration out of Yellowstone as capture operations begin

GARDINER — Hundreds of bison congregated just inside the edge of Yellowstone National Park's northern border on Thursday afternoon. Not far away, vehicles lined Old Yellowstone Trail road outside of the park, where hunters and their families pulled bison carcass parts on sleds.

Driven in part by strong winter weather, bison have been crossing over the border of Yellowstone National Park into the state of Montana in more abundance this winter than during the previous two seasons, officials report.

Yellowstone bison migrate out of the park's high country toward lower elevations in search of forage each winter. They often cross over its northern and western border into Montana, where state and Tribal hunters have opportunities to harvest them.

While the numbers are still tentative, since harvest reports continue to filter in, Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks spokesperson Morgan Jacobsen estimated on Wednesday that hunters have killed approximately 170 Yellowstone bison in total so far this winter season. Individuals from multiple Tribal nations have harvested the majority of those bison, and they include hunters from the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes, Nez Perce Tribe, Blackfeet Nation, Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation.

'Bison' on the loose in Indiana turn out to be yaks From UPI

Jan. 10 (UPI) -- Authorities in Indiana said a herd of loose animals initially thought to be bison turned out to be something even more unusual: yaks.

The Noblesville Fire Department, Noblesville Police Department and Hamilton County Sheriff's Office responded Monday to a report of large animals on the loose in Noblesville. "There are bison loose near 161st Street east of Hazel Dell Parkway. Please use alternative routes so they can be safely returned to their home," the fire department wrote in a social media post.

The police department later clarified that the animals weren't bison.

"Animal identification was not covered at the academy. These are yaks, and while they may not be as regal as bison, it was still a fun call," police wrote in a Facebook post. The yaks, native to Tibet and Nepal, were safely corralled and returned to their owner's property.

USDA Expands Eligibility, Enhances Benefits for Key Disaster Programs

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10, 2023 ? The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) made updates to several conservation, livestock and crop disaster assistance programs to give more farmers, ranchers, and tribes the opportunity to apply for and access programs that support recovery following natural disasters. Specifically, USDA?s Farm Service Agency (FSA) expanded eligibility and enhanced available benefits for a suite of its programs. These updates will provide critical assistance to producers who need to rebuild and recover after suffering catastrophic losses of production and infrastructure due to natural disasters.

FSA has updated the following programs: The Emergency Conservation Program (ECP),

the Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP), the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-raised Fish (ELAP), the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

The updates to these programs build on other Biden-Harris administration efforts to improve disaster assistance programs, including additional flexibility in obtaining Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) basic coverage for socially disadvantaged, beginning, limited resource and veteran farmers and ranchers.

Previous enhancement to the ELAP provide program benefits to producers of fish raised for food and other aquaculture species as well as cover above normal expenses for transporting livestock to forage and grazing acres and transport feed to livestock impacted by qualifying drought. And earlier updates to the LIP payment rates better reflect the true market value of non-adult beef, beefalo, bison and dairy animals.?

Yesterday, FSA announced it would begin accepting applications for the Emergency Relief Program (ERP) Phase Two and the new Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program (PARP) on Jan. 23, 2023, through June 2, 2023. ERP Phase Two is designed to fill gaps in the delivery of program benefits not covered in ERP Phase One and improves equity in program delivery to underserved producers. PARP will help address gaps in previous pandemic assistance, which was targeted at price loss or lack of market access, rather than overall revenue losses. USDA Offers Disaster Assistance for Producers Impacted by Inclement Weather

USDA also offers disaster assistance programs, which is especially important to livestock, fruit and vegetable, specialty and perennial crop producers who have fewer risk management options.

It's critical to keep accurate records to document all losses following this devastating cold weather event. Livestock producers are advised to document beginning livestock numbers by taking time and date-stamped video or pictures prior to after the loss.

Other common documentation options include: Purchase records Production records Vaccination records Bank or other loan documents Third-party certification

Additional details - including payment calculations - can be found on our NAP, ELAP, LIP, and TAP fact sheets. On farmers.gov, the Disaster Assistance Discovery Tool, Disaster-at-a-Glance fact sheet, and Farm Loan Discovery Tool can help you determine program or loan options.

While we never want to have to implement disaster programs, we are here to help. To file a Notice of Loss or to ask questions about available programs, contact your local USDA Service Center. All USDA Service Centers are open for business, including those that restrict in-person visits or require appointments because of the pandemic.

Request for Proposals for Farmers for Soil Health

The submission deadline for full proposals is February 28, 2023.

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, in partnership with the Farmers for Soil Health collaboration, anticipates awarding competitive grants to accelerate the voluntary adoption of cover crops on corn and soybean farms in 20 states.

NCAT is a partner in this project. The program is expected to award approximately \$15 million in grants in 2023. Applicants should propose state-level or multi-state programs to support Farmers for Soil Health in one or more of the 20 eligible states.

Grantees are limited to state corn, soy, or pork commodity affiliate organizations or their designated partners.
