NBA Gets Tutorial on New Bison Genetics Study

Chairs of three NBA committees in addition to President Chad Kremer and Executive Director Jim Matheson were provided an overview of the recently published research paper on modern-day bison genetics. Dr. Carter Kruse, chair of the Science and Research Committee, Ken Klemm, chair of the Conservation Committee and Dr. Connor Elliott, chair of the North American Bison Registry all participated.

Abstract:

During the late nineteenth century North American bison underwent a significant population bottleneck resulting in a reduction in population size of over 99% and a species-level near-extinction event. Factors responsible for this destruction included indiscriminate killing, loss of access to suitable habitat, and diseases. At the nadir of this population crash, very few wild plains bison survived and were restricted to Yellowstone National Park, USA and a small number of wild wood bison remained in Wood Buffalo National Park, Canada. However, most surviving bison in the late 1800's were maintained by cattle ranchers in private herds where hybridization between bison with various breeds of domestic cattle was often encouraged. Over the last 20 years, the legacy of this introgression has been identified using mitochondrial DNA and limited nuclear microsatellite analyses. However, no genome-wide assessment has been performed, and some herds were believed to be free of introgression based on current genetic testing strategies. Herein, we report detailed analyses using whole genome sequencing from nineteen modern and six historical bison, chosen to represent the major lineages of bison, to identify and quantitate signatures of nuclear introgression in their recent (within

200 years) history.

Technical Assistance Available for Bison Processing Expansion

Bison producers and processors looking to access any of the USDA grants or loans being offered for expansion of the meat processing sector are encouraged to utilize the network of technical assistance that USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) has established to support individuals, businesses and groups accessing those resources.

AMS has established agreements with eight organizations—Including the Niche Meat Processors Assistance Network, the American Association of Meat Processors and the Intertribal Agricultural Council—to provide technical assistance and outreach to people requesting and receiving USDA funding for meat processing expansion.

People can request technical assistance by clicking this link: https://flowerhill.institute/usda-mppta, to provide information regarding the type of technical assistance needed.

The form will be received by the Flower Hill Institute, an indigenous-led nonprofit coordinating the network on behalf of AMS. The staff at Flower Hill then assigns each request to the appropriate person or organization within the network to provide assistance and support. (The Flower Hill team includes former NBA Executive Director Dave Carter)

While the experts within the network cannot write grants or conduct feasibility studies, they can provide information and guidance as people navigate the process of applying for grants and loans, and as recipients implement their projects.

Montana State student publishes research on bison distribution and abundance over past 20,000 years

BOZEMAN – Though bison are often closely associated with the Great Plains, a new study by a Montana State University doctoral student has found that bison actually occupied much of North America over the last 20,000 years.

John Wendt, a doctoral student in the <u>Department of Earth Sciences</u> in <u>MSU's College of Letters and Science</u>, studies how the distribution and abundance of large herbivores, such as bison, changed over thousands of years. His paper, "<u>Large-scale Climatic Drivers of Bison Distribution and Abundance in North America Since the Last Glacial Maximum,"</u> written with his MSU academic adviser David McWethy as well as Chris Widga from East Tennessee State University and Bryan Shuman from the University of Wyoming, was published online in the journal Quaternary Science Reviews in April.

The paper is the first to combine a large, interdisciplinary dataset to reconstruct how the distribution of bison herds shifted, expanding and contracting across North America over the last 20,000 years. By mapping the occurrence of bison fossils over time, researchers determined that the animals occupied much of North America, not just the Great Plains region.

"This study brings a more holistic view of bison and how they responded to a varying climate," Wendt said. "It also adds to our knowledge about how bison responded to past environments."

8th white bison born to herd at Sioux Valley Dakota Nation (From The CBC)

With a new white bison calf joining the herd in Sioux Valley Dakota Nation, community members say it's a sign to get back to living in balance with nature.

The calf born on April 16 is the eighth white bison to be born on the First Nation in as many years. They are part of a herd of 104 bison in the community about 40 kilometres

west of Brandon, Man.

"The white buffalo is a blessing and a warning for our people, not just Native people but all people," said Kevin Tacan, one of the community's spiritual advisors, whose family also takes care of the herd.

Tacan said climate change is noticeable not only to us, but to animals as well

"They're starting to come back, reminding us that we're supposed to be living in balance with nature," he said.

"We're supposed to be living in balance with the animals and the natural world, and we're not doing that."

Tacan said First Nations have a special relationship with bison.

"We have a very close, spiritual relationship with the buffalo, because we both experienced genocide," he said.

Escaped bison that went viral captures 'community spirit' in Seabeck

SEABECK — The juvenile bison had become an elusive social media darling. She had escaped from a rural property near Crosby in November last year but had, improbably, popped up again last month, still alive. Her appearance made waves on social media.

Would she make it back home? After months off the radar, presumably wandering the wide swath of wooded lands near what had briefly been her home, might the animal get a rosy, Disney-esque ending to her tale? A video posted in a Facebook group for the greater Seabeck area showed her trotting down Seabeck Holly Road last week.

Two days later, another post announced a dour conclusion to the closely watched story: The animal had been struck and killed on the same road. The bison would be loaded up and hauled away.

Kitsap Animal Control Director Chase Connolly confirmed that his office had received a report that the animal had been struck by a vehicle.

"It seemed like it was going in the right direction to get back to the property and things were lining up great," he said. "There were unforeseen circumstances, and it just didn't work out."

WOTUS regional roundtables set to begin; farm groups express frustration about process

Virtual roundtables to discuss the Environmental Protection Agency and Army Corps of Engineers' effort to come up with a "durable" definition of "waters of the U.S." will kick off Monday. But many in agriculture and on Capitol Hill say they're perplexed by the organization of the events and how exactly the agencies plan to use the information gleaned from the dialogues.

Five of the roundtables, which will feature representatives from a diverse range of conservation, farming and other groups, have been organized by farm-related organizations, including the Farm Bureau affiliates in North Carolina, California and

Arizona, the Regenerative Agriculture Foundation, and Kansas Livestock Association. The Monday roundtable was put together by the National Parks Conservation Association and begins at 9:30 a.m. CT. Links to view the roundtables have been posted by EPA and are also available below.

"As EPA and Army continue toward WOTUS implementation that is durable and protects our water resources, it is essential that we hear from diverse perspectives and understand regional variations in how that plays out," EPA Assistant Administrator for Water Radhika Fox said. "We believe all Americans support clean water and look forward to the interesting dialogue that will be cultivated in these roundtables."

The way the roundtables were organized has caused some consternation from groups worried about the latest rewrite of the controversial definition of WOTUS, which has divided industry and environmentalists for decades.

EPA and the Corps asked groups last fall to submit nominations for roundtables that include representatives from "agriculture, conservation groups, developers, drinking water and wastewater managers, environmental organizations, communities with environmental justice concerns, industry, Tribal nations, and state and local governments."

Participants will learn about the science, safety and production behind this category of products from a group of nationally and internationally recognized authorities in their fields.

Laboratory demonstrations will be held in the state-of-the-art Meat Science & Animal Biologics Discovery building to reinforce important concepts discussed in the classroom. Processors from every level of experience can benefit from this program with content focused on those interested in, or currently involved in, the meat snack industry.

Attendees will study all aspects of meat snack production, from basic meat science to meat microbiology, jerky and whole muscle manufacturing processes, food safety and labeling, starter cultures and acidulants, drying technologies and nutrition, marketing and shelf life.

Minnesota awards grants to 15 processors

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) announced 15 grants to some of the state's small and mid-size processors to invest in various aspects of their operations, the agency said in a news release.

For the 2022 AGRI Meat, Poultry, Egg and Milk Processing Grant Awards program, the agency has awarded amounts from \$100,000, to Jenniges Meat Processing Inc. in Brooten, to expand a new facility with new processing equipment, including a rail system

and smokehouses, to \$12,500, to Kerkhoven Country Butcher in Kerkhoven to buy a walk-in freezer, a walk-in cooler and a meat saw.

A grant for \$50,000 has gone to Thief River Falls-based Northern Pride Inc., a grower-owned turkey processor that plans to use the funds to acquire overwrap tray equipment at its Pennington County facility. Northern Pride specializes in processing whole-bodied turkeys for private and packer labels.

Ukraine aid plan includes \$500M to boost U.S. crop production (From Meatingplace.com)

The proposed \$33 billion federal aid package to help Ukraine may also offset potential supply issues for the U.S. meat industry, as it includes funding to support domestic crop production in 2022 and 2023.

The Biden administration proposal, announced last week, would provide security, economic and humanitarian aid to Ukraine, which is under siege by Russian troops for a third month. The invasion has disrupted shipments of corn and wheat and caused shortages of crops used to feed animals that are being raised for food on a global basis.

The package includes \$500 million in domestic food production assistance in the form of additional loans and crop insurance incentives to U.S. farmers to make up for potential shortages in such crops as wheat and soybeans due to the war in Ukraine, the White House said. "Through higher loan rates and crop insurance incentives the request provides greater access to credit and lowers risk for farmers growing these food commodities, while lowering costs for American consumers." the White House said.

Funding Opportunities

Conservation Innovation Grants in New Hampshire

Applications are due by June 1, 2022.

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in New Hampshire is accepting applications for a total of \$200,000 in Conservation Innovation Grants. The minimum award will be \$75,000 and the maximum \$200,000. Applicants must share 50% of the total project cost.

Priorities include urban and small farm innovation, carbon markets innovation, energy, and weather resiliency. For FY 2022, at least 10% of the total funds available are set aside for historically underserved producers.

Qualifying entities representing historically underserved producers may qualify for a reduced match.

Conservation Innovation Grants in Texas

Applications are due by May 20, 2022.

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service has up to \$1 million available in Texas for Conservation Innovation Grants that stimulate the development and adoption of innovative conservation approaches and technologies.

Non-federal entities and individuals are invited to apply.

Conservation Innovation Grants in Virginia

Proposals are due by May 16, 2022.

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service in Virginia is seeking Conservation Innovation Grant submissions that involve research, demonstrations, outreach and educational initiatives, or technical/financial assistance strategies leading to improved soil health and/or pollinator habitat restoration.

Grants will be awarded for projects between one and three years duration with maximum awards of \$200,000 for each priority topic. The soils emphasis will be on establishing improved forbs in perennial grassland systems for greater stand diversity, forage quality and soil health. Diversity will be a key criterion for pollinator proposals.
