

The auctioneer's cry cuts through the Kansas wind on this brisk November morning. A capacity crowd of about 200 bidders and onlookers have climbed atop the catwalk above the sorting pens to peruse the sale lots of stock, starting at 8 a.m.

And now the crowd fills the metal bleachers around the sale ring, some with the goal of packing their freezers with meat for the coming year. Some with the prospect of bringing home new genetics for their herd. And some just to watch the show.

Hold on to your hats, it's the annual Maxwell Wildlife Refuge Buffalo Auction.

Maxwell Wildlife Refuge, just 6 miles north of Canton, sits on the southern edge of the Smoky Hills in central Kansas. Its 2,560 acres are managed by the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks, and Tourism, and it is one of two bison refuges in the state devoted to conserving this majestic symbol of Kansas. The other is Sandsage Bison Range and Wildlife Area, south of Garden City, Kan.

Drought forcing ranchers to reduce bison herds

STRASBURG, Colo. (KDVR) — Because of a drought affecting eastern Colorado, a bison rancher is forced to sell off a substantial portion of his herd.

As the sun begins to warm over the eastern Colorado landscape, it reveals images that could be 1,000 years old. A herd of bison grazing peacefully in the cold morning, instinctively doing what bison do.

But on this day, that calm turns into controlled chaos. It is roundup time at the Prairie Ridge Buffalo Ranch.

"See, they are following that lead cow over there. So the whole dang herd is going to go. See how they are coming out on that far side over there?" said Ray Thieman who owns the Prairie Ridge Buffalo Ranch.

Instead of horses, ATVs are used to round up the herd. Thieman said they are safer for the ranch hands and the bison.

Student research top challenges for bison management in Texas From The Pratt Tribune

Texas A&M AgriLife Research, including student projects, continues to advance science related to management of bison in Texas for conservation and production.

Perry Barboza, Ph.D., AgriLife Research professor in the Departments of Ecology and Conservation Biology and Rangeland, Wildlife and Fisheries Management, said research into the sustainability of bison in Texas for production and conservation is focused on addressing basic challenges and establishing foundational knowledge.

Barboza has supervised student research related to bison, a species that once ranged the length of the Great Plains within the two Texas A&M College of Agriculture and Life Sciences departments.

Bison could become an increasingly important animal option for Texas ranchers, but for now, they represent a niche opportunity, he said. Meat commands a premium – around \$9 per pound for ground bison – but production is limited by problems ranging from parasites and disease to temperament.

Most bison are marketed as yearlings between 300500 pounds, Barboza said. This makes each animal's body condition and maximizing daily weight gain vitally important for producers.

Métis Nation-Saskatchewan bringing bison back to Batoch

Bison will soon return to Batoche thanks to an agreement between the Métis Nation-Saskatchewan and Parks Canada.

The decision follows a land agreement this summer which transferred 690 hectares of land at Batoche from Parks Canada to the Métis Nation. A new agreement signed Friday will see bison transferred from Grasslands National Park to Batoche.

The first phase of the agreement will see 24 bison returned to the Back to Batoche festival grounds, and the second phase will place the "growing herd" on the land belonging to Métis citizens.

Michelle LeClair, vice-president of the Métis Nation-Saskatchewan, said the agreement is huge for the Métis people, who have traditionally had a close relationship with the animals.

Bison projects, Bob Marshall Wilderness get millions for conservation From *The Billings Gazette*

The Biden-Harris administration and National Fish and Wildlife Foundation last week announced nearly \$91 million in grants made through the America the Beautiful Challenge. Fifty-five inaugural grants will support conservation and restoration projects in 42 states, three U.S. territories and 14 tribal nations — including the Fort Belknap Indian Community and Blackfeet Nation in Montana.

Applicants this year submitted 527 proposals, requesting a total of \$1.1 billion. The grants issued addressed about 10% of the overall demand, according to a news release. About one-third of the grants will support projects implemented by tribes.

The America the Beautiful Challenge encouraged applicants to develop projects that would address conservation and restoration needs and showcase benefits to fish and wildlife, carbon emissions and benefit underserved communities, among other things. The Fort Belknap Indian Community was awarded \$4,985,200 for its intertribal approach to restoring bison and landscape connectivity, according to a news release.

In collaboration with the Blackfeet, Chippewa Cree, Fort Belknap and Fort Peck tribes, this project will enhance ecosystem function on 57,000 acres by supporting daily operations related to bison programs, removing or replacing more than 100 miles of fencing with wildlife-friendly fence and establishing common rangeland monitoring across four tribal communities.

USDA boosts "climate-smart" investments

As the 2022 United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP27) drew to a close, USDA Secy. Tom Vilsack announced the agency would make another \$300 million investment in

a second pool of pilot projects by the end of the year, the agency said in a news release. The additional funds bring USDA's total expected investment to \$3.1 billion.

USDA's Partnerships for Climate-Smart Commodities are intended to expand markets for climate-smart commodities, leverage the greenhouse gas benefits of climate-smart production and provide direct benefits to agriculture, including for small and underserved producers.

The first funding pool was directed toward 70 pilot projects in all 50 U.S. states. The \$300 million additional funds are earmarked for more than 65 additional projects focused on enrolling small and underserved producers, as well as on methods to be developed at minority-serving institutions for monitoring, reporting and verifying the benefits of climatesmart agricultural practices.

FACT now accepting applications for next round of Fund-a-Farmer Grants!

From FACT

The deadline for livestock and poultry farmers to apply is January 10, 2023. Grants will be awarded in March 2023.

FACT awards competitive grants of up to \$3,000 to working, independent farmers located in the 50 United States and five major U.S. territories who raise beef cattle, bison, broiler chickens, dairy cows, ducks, geese, goats, laying hens, pigs, sheep and/or turkeys. This year, FACT will fund the following types of projects:

- -Farms that wish to improve and expand pasture for animals. These grants for farms to transition to pasture-based systems, expand animals? access to well-managed pasture, and improve the quality of pasture for animals.
- -Farms seeking one of three animal welfare certifications: Certified Animal Welfare Approved by A Greener World, Certified Humane, or Global Animal Partnership Animal Welfare Certified (steps 4 to 5+). These grants will be made for on-farm projects that help improve animal welfare.
- -Farms that already hold one of the welfare certifications above to build capacity or maintain certification. These grants can be for on-farm production-related projects, or for other projects related to the marketing, sales, and distribution of welfare-certified products.

US declares lab-grown meat safe to eat in 'groundbreaking' move

The US government has cleared the way for Americans to be able to eat lab-grown meat, after authorities deemed a meat product derived from animal cells to be safe for human consumption.

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will allow a California company called Upside Foods to take living cells from chickens and then grow them in a controlled laboratory environment to produce a meat product that doesn't involve the actual slaughter of any animals.

'Fishless fish': the next big trend in the seafood industry. The FDA said it was ready to

approve the sale of other lab-grown meat, stating that it was "engaged in discussions with multiple firms" to do the same, including companies that want to grow seafood from the cells of marine life.

Unusual Early Blizzard in the Northern Plains

An early season blizzard in the Upper Midwest, which started on November 10, broke snowfall records for the date. The storm stretched from Wyoming to northern Minnesota, with North Dakota bearing the brunt of the snowfall.

The National Weather Service in Bismarck, North Dakota, measured 17.1 inches of snow, nearly double of the previous record of 9.1 inches for the day, and nearly reaching all time one day record of 17.3 inches. Snow depth measurements in the nearby area of Mandan were as high as 24 inches.

High winds accompanied the storms had gusts as high a 40–50 mph, creating drifts of 3 to 5 feet.

USDA and Three Tribal Nations to Enter Historic Conservation Reserve Program Enhancement Program Agreements to Support Working Lands Conservation

RAPID CITY, South Dakota, Nov. 17, 2022— Three Tribal Nations in the Great Plains are partnering with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to help conserve, maintain and improve grassland productivity, reduce soil erosion, and enhance wildlife habitat through the <u>Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program</u> (CREP). The Cheyenne River, Oglala and Rosebud Sioux Tribes are entering into CREP agreements with USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) to enroll eligible grassland, pastureland, and other agricultural lands within the boundaries of their reservations in this conservation program.

USDA Requests Public Input on Implementation of Inflation Reduction Act Funding

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17, 2022 – USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will use the investments provided through IRA-funded conservation programs to support farmers and ranchers in adopting and expanding climate-smart activities and systems. NRCS asks for comments on how to target program benefits, quantify impact, and improve program delivery and outreach, especially for underserved producers. Comments are due Dec. 22, 2022. NRCS will identify immediate changes that can be made in fiscal year 2023 and will continue to identify and adopt additional changes in future years.

"Agriculture is at the forefront of the nation's effort to address climate change, and we want to hear from people on the ground how to implement our programs to maximize climate benefits, promote equity and assist all producers," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "From climate-smart agriculture, to supporting healthy forests and conservation, to tax credits, to biofuels, infrastructure and beyond, this legislation provides USDA with

significant additional resources to lead this historic charge."

The Inflation Reduction Act provided unprecedented funding levels for several of the existing programs that NRCS implements. The increased funding levels begin in fiscal year 2023 and rapidly build over four years, totaling these additional amounts:

- \$8.45 billion Environmental Quality Incentives Program
- \$3.25 billion Conservation Stewardship Program
- \$4.95 billion Regional Conservation Partnership Program
- \$1.4 billion Agricultural Conservation Easement Program
- \$1 billion Conservation Technical Assistance

NRCS is asking for public input on to how to best maximize benefits for climate mitigation, including targeting practices and programs that provide quantifiable reductions in greenhouse gas emissions. Additionally, NRCS is requesting feedback to help identify strategies and provide recommendations on how to maximize, target, monitor, and quantify improvements to soil carbon, reductions in nitrogen losses, and the reduction, capture, avoidance, or sequestration of carbon dioxide, methane or nitrous oxide emissions associated with agricultural production. NRCS is also seeking ideas for how to further streamline and improve program delivery to increase efficiencies and expand program access for producers, especially underserved producers.
