One major factor inhibits continued growth in the consumer marketplace: SUPPLY.

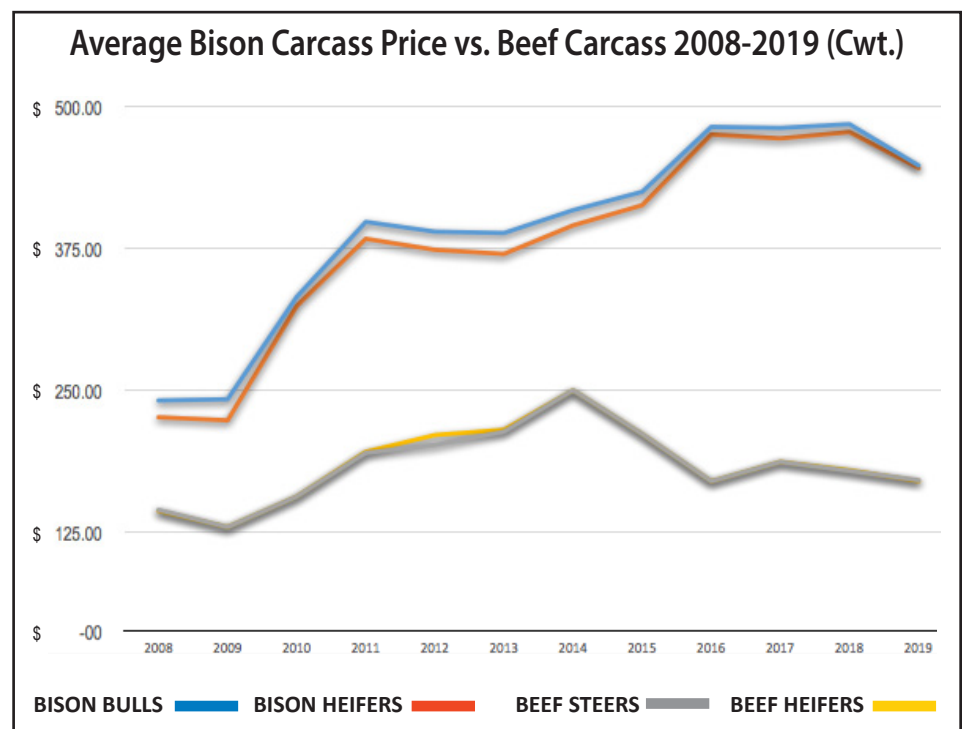
New Bison Producers Needed!

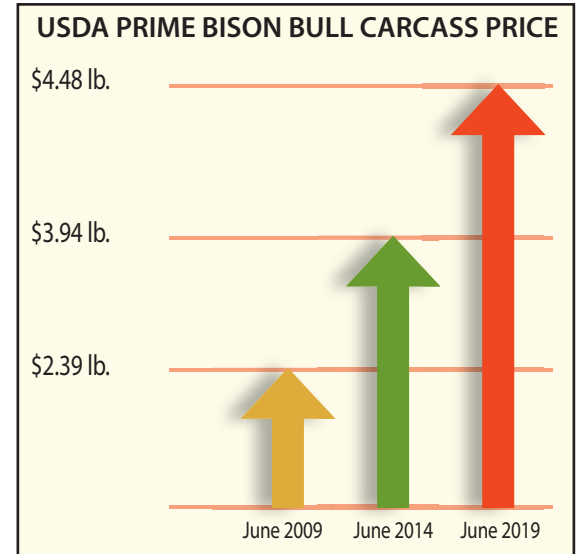
